This package is an overview of the Summit, which includes 3 plenary conversations, many networking breaks, and 4 blocks of 5 parallel 'break-out' sessions (panels, workshops, challenging conversations, and outdoor walks and exercises), all to keep our minds nourished. To keep our bodies nourished, the Summit includes an offsite BBQ, two breakfasts, two lunches, and an opening dinner. This plenary 'fireside' chat will explore how different cultures and sectors see (or have the potential to see) the world through a systems lens. 	Decision-making in a (Poly)crisis: The Urgency of Slowing Down  It is widely acknowledged that the human community is in a state of polycrisis and permacrisis, with global challenges, 'wicked problems', and 'mega messes', all related to each other in some way. These challenges come in cascading waves that exacerbate the ability to make sense of, nevermind 'solve' these complex challenges. Moreover, their effects are most acutely felt by young people, women, Indigenous, Black and racialized people, and others who are marginalized because of their socio-economic standing, ability, geography, or other factors where inequity amplifies the impact. But counterintuitively, as an open letter to worldwide civil society organizations by the philosopher, writer, and activist Bayo Akomolafe and theologian Marta Benavides urges "The time is very urgent – we must slow down." How do we take the time to really understand, dig deep, ask better questions, and assert a systems-led approach to challenges when there is social, political and cultural pressure to 'act fast'?

The Northpine Foundation supports ventures to achieve scalable outcomes for underserved and underinvested communities in Canada. With a portfolio that includes refugees and formerly incarcerated persons, Scarborough, and rural Newfoundland and Labrador, Northpine funds approximately \$50 million annually and is on a path to deploy \$1 billion over the next decade. Northpine is pioneering a tailored financing model that includes grants, loans, equity, and blended finance while building deep relationships to work with investees to learn, unlearn, and relearn.
